Community Education Highlights

❖ Friends is now the primary sponsor of the annual Lecture Series (previously Beach Watcher lecture series) that was moved to the Northwest Educational Services District Building last year to accommodate an ever-growing audience. Four lectures were hosted with very engaging speakers and informative topics. The Lecture Series continues to be a popular event during the dark winter months, helping us make it through to spring. The lectures now routinely draw over 100 attendees due to the engaging presentations and the organizational skills of the volunteers that organize the project. Thanks to the team members for their good work and service to the community. Friends support included providing the insurance liability coverage, facility rental fees, and printing costs. Planning for the 2014 Lecture Series is underway.


Friends sponsored the second annual Fidalgo Shoreline Academy in April 2013. The event was held at the Fidalgo Bay Resort without charge courtesy of the Samish Indian Nation. Approximately 70 people attended the day-long symposium that offered a keynote address and selected topics from multiple offerings in three workshop sessions. Offerings included presentations and interpretive walks. Surveys indicated that attendees enjoyed the day and plan to attend next year. The event is the primary fundraiser for Friends and proceeds from event were ~\$2,000. Earnings were from the registration and a raffle with donated prizes that were awarded at the event. Next year's symposium is tentatively scheduled for April 5, 2014 at the Resort and the program and registration information will be available on the Friends website in the February/March timeframe. - The Friends' Trail Tales project, funded through a grant from the WA Department of Ecology had another very successful year. Trail Tales provided educational and interpretive programs aimed at raising public awareness about Ecology's Anacortes Baywide Cleanup project, focusing on the cleanup of the Custom Plywood Mill site, which is nearing completion. A secondary goal of the Trail Tales project is to promote stewardship of the Skagit County's marine ecosystems in support of the State's Puget Sound Initiative.
- In partnership with the Skagit MRC and WWU Shannon Point Marine Center, Friends co-sponsored the Skagit County premiere of the documentary "Ocean Frontiers - The Dawn of a New Age of Ocean Stewardship" in Anacortes at the NW Educational Services District Building. The event was attended by over 100 people and was highly praised by attendees. Friends is looking into partnering with these groups again in 2014 to offer the film at the Lincoln Theatre.
- During the past year, Trail Tales offered 15 interpretive programs including 13 walks and 2 bike rides. In collaboration with the City of Anacortes Parks and Recreation Department, Friends installed 15 interpretive signs covering topics including shoreline history, ecology, and cleanup work. Friends hosted a ribbon cutting ceremony that included State Representative Kris Lytton, Mayor Maxwell, Parks & Recreation Director Gary Robinson, City Council members, Samish Indian Nation members, WA Ecology, WA DNR, Tesoro, Soroptimists and community members dedicating the signs along the Tommy Thompson Trail. - The Trail Tales project has expanded the Friends website with new content related to the interpretive sign subjects. Over the next two years, the online content on these topics will be expanded. New features that will be developed include posting "Creature Features" audio tales about life in our local marine environment. The project also plans to engage WWU interns to develop a documentary video about the Anacortes Baywide cleanup that WA Ecology is undertaking in partnership with other local organizations. - ❖ Using a portion of the Trail Tales grant, Friends provided funding to WWU's Shannon Point Marine Center to develop a model curriculum and deliver a class focusing on the watershed that feeds Fidalgo Bay. Several in-class units were presented on the history of the waterfront, Fidalgo Island watershed, sources of water pollution, and included a field trip. The class was offered to all 8th grade students at the Anacortes Middle School. Surveys of teachers involved with the class highly praised the work of Denise Crowe who developed and presented the curriculum to the students.





Friends sponsored a National Estuaries Day celebration event in conjunction with Fidalgo Bay Day. This event offered information and activity tables strategically stationed along the Tommy Thompson Trail. Discovery passports developed in collaboration with the Washington Environmental Council were made available for both kids and adults to learn about Ecology's cleanup work, the Fidalgo Bay Aquatic Reserve, and local marine ecology. The passport contained questions about each station that, if answered correctly, earned the participant a reward sticker. Participants completing most of the stations were awarded a recycled glass sun catcher. Based on the success of this year's event, Friends plans to continue sponsoring this as part of next year's Fidalgo Bay Day offerings.







Citizen Science

❖ Friends provided a \$300 donation to the Pacific Biodiversity Institute to support their research on harbor porpoises in Puget Sound. This is a popular project with local volunteers with a number of Friends members volunteering to collect observational data on harbor porpoise in Skagit County. Their work has been highlighted in the news media recently as an important research effort on an indicator species that can be tied to the health of our marine ecosystems. ❖ A number of Friends members are supporting a WA DNR sponsored citizen science forage fish survey program in conjunction with the Fidalgo Bay Aquatic Reserve Citizen Stewardship Committee. Friends has offered funding to support equipment and supplies needed by volunteers and will continue support the program in the coming year. Friends of Skagit Beaches Trail Tales Public Participation Grant renewed.

The WA Department of Ecology has awarded Friends of Skagit Beaches a two-year renewal grant under the Public Participation Grant program. Ecology officials stated at the recent ribbon cutting ceremony that the project has been one of the most successful that they have funded. They also indicated they feel the grant has been very well managed by Friends. The new grant will provide \$116,000 through June 30, 2015 to continue the education and

outreach work that was begun under the prior grant. Approximately 15 additional interpretive signs will be installed along the Tommy Thompson Trail and north from 34th Street extended to Guemes Channel. Friends will be working with the Anacortes Parks Department and Port of Anacortes on the development and installation of these signs. The Port has committed to provide \$5,000 matching funds to support development of signs that will be installed on their property. Interpretive walks, bike rides and special events will continue to be offered to the community. Training for new volunteers is planned for early in 2014.
